Improved Fuel Consumption Outweighs Initial Fuel Cost

Using premium petrol (highest octane available) improves engine performance and extends its life, reduces pollution and improves fuel consumption. Although it is dearer per tank, the mileage increase more than compensates for this. On open roads (highways, freeways, motorways etc.) drive with the windows closed: it reduces wind resistance and improves fuel consumption. - *Contributed by Liljana*, *Cronulla*

ReImbursed Gas Conversion Saves in the Long Term

I'm saving around \$8,000 on fuel costs over the life of my car and got paid by the Government. I was reimbursed \$2,000 on the cost of converting my car to LPG by the Government, which was almost the full cost of the conversion. So not only was the conversion cheap, but instead of paying around \$1.25 litre for petrol I now only pay 49c litre for gas. Looking at petrol costs of say \$25/week that's a saving of \$15.20/week or \$7,904 over 10 years. - Contributed by Sandra, Erskine Park

Know How Much to Travel Here and There

With the cost of petrol going up I wanted to calculate how much it is costing me to get to various destinations. All you need is the average number of kilometres your car will get on a full tank, and how much it costs to fill up your tank. My car gets on average 380 kilometres, and it costs about \$100 to fill her up on today's petrol prices. (Eeek!) 100 divided by 380 gives me about 0.26, that's 26 cents for every kilometre I travel. Then all I need is the approximate distance to get here or there. Eg. To travel 10kms will cost me \$2.60, or \$5.20 there and back. I also use the map maker on the website http://www.travelmate.com.au This tells you exactly how many kms from one place to another anywhere in Australia. It is amazing how much I reconsider hopping in the car when I know how much it is costing me to get there! I can then think out my trips better, saving me both money and time. - Contributed by Bernadette, Greensborough

Regular Service Saves Fuel

Having grown up in a family of mechanics; the most important tip for saving fuel when running a car, is to make sure your cars are serviced regularly and in particular make sure they are tuned properly. The fuel consumption of an engine that is poorly tuned can be very high. I drive an old 1992 Fairlane Ghia and it is more economical to run than our late model Fairlane Ghia. They are both in top condition, but the later model has(EFI) Electronic Fuel Injection, and that in itself makes a car more fuel hungry. - Contributed by Christine, Regents Park
